Standards Focus: Figurative Language One of the most captivating aspects of good literature is the use of figurative language, or ideas communicated beyond their literal meaning to create an image in the reader's or audience's mind. There are several types of

Metaphors: (Act I Scene III) "This precious book of love, this unbound lover, To beautify him, only lacks a cover" In this quote, Lady Capulet explains to Juliet that Paris would make a worth husband because he is a "precious book of love", and that he is only missing a cover (Juliet would be the "cover").

### **Figurative Language - Romeo and Juliet**

Act II is rich in figurative language, opening immediately with personification. Banquo refers to the moon as "she.". He then notices that "There's husbandry in heaven. Their candles are all out."

Those in heaven who control such things have dimmed the stars for a dark night.
