PHRASAL VERBS Phrasal verbs are verb+preposition combinations, so they are usually two-word expressions (sometimes more). For example, 'look + after', 'put off', 'take + up' or 'put + up with'. The meaning of a phrasal verb is often very different from the original verb: She's looking after the children.

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Collocations, Idioms and Phrasal Verbs IN CONTEXT Collocations A collocation (also collocate) is a word or phrase which is frequently used with another word or phrase, in a way that sounds correct to speakers of the language. For example, heavy rain Idioms An expression whose meaning is different from the meaning of the individual words.
