And when Lancelot and Guinevere are finally reunited, the consequences of both their ordeals will unleash a torrent of anguish and desire. With familiar names brilliantly repositioned for a new generation of Arthurian fans—evil Merlin, conniving Igraine, complex Lancelot, tainted Arthur, and of course, warrior Guinevere—Alice Borchardt's creation stands as a testament to the power of imagination.
