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Epilepsy is a chronic disease characterized by recurrent unprovoked seizures. In 2015, there were an estimated 470,000 children in the United States who were considered to have active epilepsy.1 And while most children with epilepsy become seizure-free with their first trial of an anticonvulsant medication, up to 30% of children are refractory or treatment-resistant to standard anticonvulsant ...

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Benign rolandic epilepsy (BRE) This syndrome affects 15% of children with epilepsy and can start at any time between the ages of 3 and 10. Children may have very few seizures and most become seizure-free by the age of 16.

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
