In 1987, Alyson Publications reprinted Better Angel under the assumption the author was no longer living. After being notified about the publication from a friend, Forman went to A Different Light bookstore to purchase a copy. "It's a very good book, well written," the person at the shop told Forman, "I think you'll like it." "I hope so," responded Forman, "I wrote it!" Forman was subsequently put in touch with the publishers and in 1990, nearly 60 years after first being published, Better Angel was released with Forman listed as the author instead of a pseudonym. Of the unexpected turn of events, For-

man would comment, "I think the most rewarding thing that has happened to me has been the rediscovery of Better Angel, and the realization that its message of hope-or the possibility of hope-is still pertinent and as warming as it proved 60 years ago."

It will be particularly useful to those wishing to produce well-designed materials for teaching initial literacy via phonics, for teaching English as a foreign or second language, and for teacher training. English spelling is notoriously complicated and difficult to learn; it is correctly described as much less regular and predictable than any other alphabetic orthography. However, there is more regularity in the English spelling system than is generally appreciated. This book provides, for the first time, a thorough account of the whole complex system. It does so by describing how phonemes relate to graphemes and vice versa. It enables searches for particular words, so that one can easily find, not the meanings or pronunciations of words, but the other words with which those with unusual phoneme-grapheme/grapheme-phoneme correspondences keep company. Other unique features of this book include teacher-friendly lists of correspondences and various regularities not described by previous authorities, for example the strong tendency for the letter-name vowel phonemes (the names of

the letters) to be spelt with those single letters in non-final syllables.

I was four years old and remember being with my mother in a room in our apartment in Breslau, which was filled with flowers and growing plants (mother always had a marvellous gift for

maintaining and nursing plants) and various friends coming in to condole with her over the death of my baby brother, Hans, who had died of cholera, which was then raging in Breslau. The second child of my parents, born in 1860, had been christened Richard, after Richard Wagner, who had officiated as godfather at the ceremony. This child lived but a short time, and Wagner had vowed that he would never again stand as godfather for the children of any of his friends, as the ill luck which had pursued him all his life was thus carried even into their families.

For contemporary classical liberals, Bastiat's correspondence will provide a unique window into a long-forgotten world where opposition to war and colonialism went hand-in-hand with support for free trade and deregulation. Bastiat's numerous letters to Richard Cobden, a Member of Parliament and best known today as the leader of the British Anti-Corn Law League, chronicle the profound effect the Anti-Corn League had on Bastiat. The League's success in mobilizing a popular movement in England to pressure the British government into abolishing the very protectionist "corn laws," in 1846, inspired Bastiat to emulate the League's success in France by starting his own free-trade movement. *The Man and the Statesman* also includes articles and other writings on politics and current events that showcase Bastiat's talent as

a theoretician, a pamphleteer, a journalist, and a deputy (Member of Parliament) of the nascent French Second Republic.
