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The legalization of abortion in the United States by the Supreme Court in 1973 bypassed the political process in the majority of the states. Since then, however, political controversy and agitation in relation to abortion has become nationwide. From largely Catholic-based opposition, it has grown to encompass religious fundamentalists and to be a major part of the New Right's agenda.

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The legal status of abortion has shifted considerably with social values. In the 18th Century, English common law allowed abortion, provided it was carried out before the mother felt the foetus move ('quickening'). The Offences Against the Person Act of 1861 made abortion a criminal offence punishable by imprisonment from three years to life.

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Abortion is a cause and symbol of the ruination of American politics. It was

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A 2016 Pew Research Survey found that 59 percent of Republicans believe abortion should be illegal, and 70 percent of Democrats believe the procure should be allowed. Overall, though, a narrow majority of Americans — 56 percent in the Pew poll — support legalized abortion and 41 percent oppose it.

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Abortion was legal in the United States up to the point of quickening (the fetal movements felt in the second trimester) until the 19th century, when states began to ban abortion.

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Pro-abortion rights politicians often attempt to appear in favor of some restrictions on later term abortion by including the exception of the "health" of the mother. Failed 2016 presidential candidate Hillary Clinton also said she favors a "late-pregnancy regulation" with "exceptions for the life and health of the mother."
