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In the 1870s, swimsuits in North America involved corsets, bathing shoes and hose, according to World Clothing and Fashion: An Encyclopedia of History, Culture, and Social Influence.

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The history of women's swimwear begins with a simple outfit known as the birthday suit. All jokes aside, up until the 19th-century people frequently bathed nude. And while women were known to cover themselves with clothing that resembles our modern-day bikini, the outfits weren't for swimming.

By 1915, women athletes started to share the actual sport of swimming with men and thus began to reduce the amount of heavy fabric used in their billowing swimsuits. 1920s: By the early 1920s women's bathing suits were reduced to a one piece garment with a long top that covered shorts.

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Knitted wool swimsuits were eased into history in the mid 1930s when California swimsuit maker Mabs of Hollywood began to fashion swimwear from Lastex, a woven satin finish elastic and silk material first used for girdle manufacture. Mabs made sure of its success by making suits for Joan Crawford, Loretta Young, and Jean Harlow.

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
